## **Brad Felt**



For over 30 years, Brad Felt has been working to advance the role of both the Tuba and Euphonium as front-line improvising instruments in the idiom of modern jazz. As a product of the fertile Oakland University jazz program of the mid '70s, Mr. Felt went on to receive two fellowships for composition and performance from the National Endowment For The Arts and a creative artist grant for composition from the Michigan Council For The Arts. In addition to working in the Detroit area, he has led and co-led groups which have performed at such venues as The Hollywood Palace, Yoshi's At Jack London Square and Pearl's of North Beach. Brad has twice toured Europe as a featured soloist with Howard Johnson's Gravity (including The Barican Centre in London, The Fabrik in Hamburg and many of the top festivals and performance spaces in Germany, Austria and France) and has played Germany's prestigious Moers New Music Festival with Detroit's Kenn Cox & The Guerilla Jam Band.

His first CD as a leader – *Exordium* – was released to critical acclaim. Brad Felt has appeared on stafe with: Ellis Marsalis, Freddie Hubbard, Dave Liebman, Hank Jones, Jerry Gonzales, Bennie Maupin, Frank Foster, Thad Jones, Annie Ross, Jon Faddis, The Four Tops, Martha Reeves and many others. He is currently teaching applied improvisation at The University of Toledo.

## Mike Forbes



An artist of widely diverse musical talents, Mike Forbes has set forth on a career encompassing all aspects of performing, teaching, composing, and conducting. He has recently released his first solo album, "Forbes Plays Koetsier" on the *Summit Records* label where he features all seven works for solo tuba by Dutch composer, Jan Koetsier. Forbes has served on the faculties of Illinois State University, Mary Washington College, Columbia Union College, Frederick Community College, and was a tubist with the U.S. Army Band, "Pershing's Own." In addition to performing with a host of regional American orchestras and wind bands, Forbes spends his summers as the principal tubist with the Hot Springs Music Festival Orchestra. As the bottom tubist with the *Sotto Voce Quartet*, Forbes enjoys performing and recording exhilarating chamber music with his colleagues in

America's premiere tuba/euphonium quartet. This world-class ensemble enjoys an international touring schedule and has released a number of recordings also on the *Summit Records* label which feature Forbes's many compositions and arrangements for the genre. In addition to those works, Forbes currently serves as a writer for Carl Fischer Music specializing in creating new works for middle and high school bands and orchestras. He has published numerous pieces and regularly receives commissions from today's most well-known brass artists and band directors. For many years Forbes served as the musical director of the Brass Band of Central Illinois and is often invited to guest conduct high school and youth honor bands and brass ensembles.

Forbes studied with Toby Hanks at the University of Maryland (DMA), John Stevens at the University of Wisconsin (MM), and with Mark Lusk and Marty Erickson at the Pennsylvania State University (BM). During his junior year at Penn State he took an exchange to Manchester, England where he continued his studies with Stuart Roebuck, Brian Kingsley, and Andrew Duncan at the University of Manchester and the Royal Northern College of Music.
