## Berlin Philharmonic to perform in Ann Arbor

One of the top two or three orchestras in the world, the Berlin Philharmonic hasn't performed locally in eight years. That alone would raise expectations for Tuesday's concert in Ann Arbor. But as they say on TV, there's more!

The concert marks the local debut of the orchestra with music director Simon Rattle, the British conductor who took the reigns from Claudio Abbado in 2002. It was just last month that the orchestra announced it had extended Rattle's contract until 2018. Then there's the heavyweight program that includes two Brahms sym-

phonies — Nos. 3 and 4, along with a rarity by Arnold Schoenberg, "Accompaniment to a Cinematographic Scene," completed in 1930. And as a reminder of just how lucky we are to have the University Musical Society, the concert's producer, as part of our cultural menu in metro Detroit, the Berliners are performing in just five other cities on their U.S. tour - New York, Boston, Chicago, San Francisco and Los An-

MUSIC OF THE NIGHT: Stephen Sondheim's "A Little Night Music, which opened on Broadway in 1973, is one of the composer-lyricist's earliest masterpieces. A biting comedy of manners about several mismatched sets of lovers at the turn of the 20th Century, the sumptuous, operettalike score is written entirely in waltz time and filled with memorable tunes - "Send in the Clowns," "A Weekend in the Country," "You Must Meet My Wife," "Everyday a Little Death." Michigan Opera Theatre, which last produced the work in 1983, has brought in a pair of Broadway and TV stars, Leslie Uggams and Ron Raines, to head the cast.

MOT assistant music director Suzanne Mallare Acton will conduct, and the show will be staged by director Dona Vaughn.

RETURN OF THE RUSSIAN: Pianist Vladimir Feltsman made such a striking impression at his 2008 debut for the Chamber Music Society of Detroit that the Russian has been re-engaged pretty much as quickly as possible endorsements don't come much stronger than that. Feltsman, 57, has a rousing technique, charisma and fertile mind. The program includes a

pair of ambitious 19th-Century classics, Schubert's B-flat Sonata, D. 960, and Chopin's "4 Ballades."


